Meeting Details:

- To ensure that the URPC can deliver a recommendation to the University Senate and President Jackson on time, additional URPC meeting dates were set for March 8 and March 29 from 1:00 2:30 PM. These dates will primarily be dedicated to the reports from the Division Vice Presidents about their reduction planning for the 2024/2025 AY. Each division has been asked to develop scenarios for 3%, 5%, & 8% reductions, in light of our current understanding of an estimated \$8M shortfall next year.
- The URPC had a robust discussion on the creation of a taskforce to take on the President's charge of developing a sustainable budget model for the University. Topics included the shortfalls of our current *Incremental Model*, how other Universities have transitioned to other budget models, including the hiring of consultants with expertise in this area, who might be asked to join this taskforce, and the scope of their work. Work on this is in the early stages and more information will follow as it is available.

- We set the date and time for our next URPC Open Forum: Monday, March 25, 2024 at 1
 PM. This will be a World Cafe style forum. Additional details, including location will be
 announced as we draw closer to that date.
- A brief discussion was had on how the URPC can provide input on the Low Degree Conferring programs discussion. Though there are clearly budget implications embedded within this topic, it is not clear, given the scope of the URPC's purview, how we might provide this input. It was suggested that we may be able to ensure that the criteria that are developed and the action plans that result from those criteria align with the University's strategic plan and the Polytechnic Prospectus/Action plan.

Academic Senate CSU (ASCSU):

The <u>CSU Board of Trustees</u> met January 29-January 31. You can find the agenda packet <u>here</u> and a recording of the meeting <u>here</u>.

Some highlights of the meeting pertaining to our ongoing campus conversations:

During the segment of the Committee on Educational Policy focused on research and creative activities across the 23 campuses, President Jackson provided a brief overview of the return to the Wiyot people of the 46-acre Mouralherwaqh site and the research collaboration with Humboldt's Sea Rise Institute co-led by Dr. Laurie Richmond. Also featured in the Trustee's packet were descriptions of current Cal Poly Humboldt projects on Climate Plan for Eureka-Arcata corridor (co led by Eileen Cashman and Margaret Lang), Caminar Juntos (Walking Together) aimed to increase retention and graduation of underserved students at Hispanic Serving Institutions (Mary Gonzalez, lead investigator) and Chair Jim Woglom's work with the Prison Arts Collective Exhibition showcasing the work of incarcerated artists at Pelican Bay Prison.

In the Committee on Educational Policy discussion on Proposed Amendments to Title 5: Implementation of the Student Transfer Achievement Reform Act of 2021 (AB928), which was on the agenda to prepare for an action item that will be voted on at the March 24-27, 2024 meeting, a majority of the Trustees who sit on the Committee on Educational Policy indicated that they favor amending the current CSU GE Breadth requirements to be the same as the agreed upon Cal-GETC pathway for transfer. While they appreciated the faculty's position that

all GE classes provide value and that there is no evidence that first year first time students would be better off losing GE units in area C and area E, the Trustees in favor of a single GE pathway maintained that students need to have simplicity as they navigate their degree path, often across multiple institutions, and it wouldn't be equitable that students who begin in the CSU would need to complete more GE courses than those who transfer to the CSU. This reflects Chancellor Garcia's view as expressed during the ASCSU January plenary. Any Title V changes adopted by the Board of Trustees in March would likely need to be implemented on the Cal-GETC timeline, which begins with students entering in the 2025 catalog year.

In the Committee on Finance discussion of the CSU budget situation, Trustees noted that the state legislature is looking to all three systems of higher education in California (CCC, CSU, and UC) to increase their collaboration and efficiencies to reduce costs to lower state budgetary allocations in the long-term. Governor Newsom proposed in his January 10 budget a deferral of a 5% increase in CSU state budget allocation that was supposed to come to the CSU in fiscal year 2024-2025 if CSU met benchmarks in the 5-year "compact". The budget proposal stipulates that the CSU's 2024-2025 fiscal year 5% funding increase, as well as its 2025-2026 fiscal year 5% increase, will be included in fiscal year 2025-2026 budget proposal and appropriations, so long as the CSU keeps meeting the Compact's goals. In contrast, the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) released the 2024-2025 Higher Education overview report on January 30, 2024, which recommends not funding at all the 5% increase associated with the Governor's CSU Compact for fiscal 2024-2025, and likely not funding it for 2025-2026 given the three-year budgetary outlook, which predicts a a structural deficit of \$10 to \$30 billion each year. The LAO notes, "The compacts [with the CSU and UC] are not codified. The Legislature decides through the annual budget process which, if any, of the compact components it will enact." The Governor's liaison to the CSU Board of Trustees suggested that the CSU engage in robust advocacy with legislators to ensure that some amount of Compact funding is included in the state budget allocation for the CSU, even if it is deferred. He mentioned that while the line item deferral can seem like the Governor is not prioritizing funding higher ed, there were other worthy programs in the General Fund that were cut or went unfunded in the Governor's budget proposal. He stressed that the CSU must make the case for its funding when it is competing for General Fund appropriations funding with healthcare and services for those who are experiencing homelessness.

Presidents Lynn Mahoney of San Francisco State and Richard Yao of CSU Channel Islands shared some of the cost savings measures that they have instituted at their campuses to adjust to new lower enrollment realities. These included reducing the number of classes offered per semester and focusing on those classes that are most in demand by students or necessary for graduation; reducing or combining low-enrolled programs; increasing class sizes; instituting hiring freezes

and early retirement programs; and reducing campus support services. The Trustees seemed
enthusiastic about such strategies for reducing operating costs and even suggested that
students should be allowed to take classes over zoom at multiple campuses so that students
maintain access to classes they need when they are not being offered on their local classes due
to cuts in the class schedule.

Hi Cal Poly Humboldt University Senate!

I hope that y'all are finding your respective grooves in this 4th week of the Spring Semester of 2024. Thank you all so much for the work you are doing to support each other in fostering educative spaces. There's a lot coming up in this week's meeting, and I appreciate your taking the time to also engage in shared governance towards a more just University.

This week we will have a presentation from Peggy Metzger from Financial Aid on a series of changes in Financial Aid awards that will be happening concurrently over the next cycle of allocations. Please be sure to take some notes and spread what we learn from Peggy as there will be clear implications for many of our students, and the more that we can collectively advise and assist them, the better. She's always one of my favorite presenters on campus, combining rich knowledge with comprehensible delivery. Thank you, Peggy!

We'll also be working through a number of legislation readings (first and second) including a "Priority Registration Policy", an "Office Hour Policy", and a pair of CBC actions related to the establishment of a Committee on Committees, and the inclusion of Designees as potential co-chairs of the USFAC. Thank you to the committees who have been working on those resolutions, and to everyone who has provided feedback on them. Hopefully they will serve to improve our governance structures moving forward.

Finally, I would like to share a reflection I have been mulling over the last week following a series of experiences that were discomfiting to me, and ask that y'all hear out my often flawed thinking and provide some feedback:

We are really smart people. All of us, regardless of our respective designation or community on campus, are educated, and passionate, and committed to knowledge and criticality at a truly staggering level. In many cases we are also, rightfully, proud of the knowledge and expertise that we have pursued and accrued through our own passionate studies. We (or at least I, but I hope some folx might resonate with me here) existentially self-identify with our pursuits, interests, and the stuff that we think is important to discuss in classrooms and labs and conference rooms. They become a part of how we describe ourselves; when asked about myself, I say I am an Art Teacher, and I view much of the world and my interactions in it through that named lens.

I don't want to come off as assailing this tendency, or preaching self-righteously (I certainly will be retaining my Art Teacher-ness for as long as I am allowed). What I ask, though, is that we take some time in those interactions we have with our colleagues, friends, and community, to consider the partisanship that our own theoretical and disciplinary self-identifications can affect in our discourse and actions. If I allow my attachment to Art Education to justify any and all action that I take or text I generate, I run the risk of carelessly othering and even outright hurting those who I perceive to be questioning or threatening my thing.

I guess what I am advocating for, and requesting feedback on, is a proposal that we all make an effort to take a second, whenever we feel backed into a corner about the stuff we love and spend our lives working for, to check to make sure that we do not forget or deny the humanity of those that we find ourselves in opposition to. I'm not suggesting that we give up on passionate advocacy for and defense of what we think is right, but that we maintain and support and protect the emotional and physical safety of those we find ourselves in disagreement and dissensus with, such that we can all be whole and ready to passionately advocate during the next moment of dissent (or, who knows, maybe agreement!).

Again, I don't want to be a hugely condescending jerk here (though, if it walks like a duck...). I just worry sometimes that when we are really excited about really important stuff, we run the risk of forgetting that we hopefully care about each other and need each other to keep this immense and complex venture running. Beyond that need, tying our individual health and care in a web of respectful mutuality might serve to protect us (read: me) when we inevitably mess up. Let's, please, do what we can to be good to one other while we do our darndest to communicate and work toward our often disparate, but more often intrinsically aligned positions.








Coordinating Aid and the Middle Class Scholarship (MCS)

- All additional resources (scholarships, stipends, awards, gift cards, etc) students receive must be coordinated with other aid within the current aid year – with the exception of WAGES
- Students are not allowed to receive more aid in total than their Cost of Attendance (COA)
- Middle Class Scholarship is designed to be a GAP award (to fill the gap between aid and COA)
- ANY change in aid, COA or enrollment level we must recalculate MCS
- To the student, the scholarship feels like it got reduced

Resolution on the Priority Registration Policy

15-23/24-APC - February 6, 2023 - First Reading

RESOLVED: That the University Senate of Cal Poly Humboldt recommends to the president that the attached Priority Registration Policy be approved; and be it further

RESOLVED: That the policy be implemented beginning AY 24/25

RATIONALE: The purpose of this policy is to define the different types of registration considered priority registration, the student groups eligible for priority registration, and the order in which the Office of the Registrar assigned enrollment appointments. This policy reflects the students required to receive priority registration based on the California Education Code, as well as priority registration eligibility based on existing campus practices.



DRAFT- Priority Registration Policy Policy Number 15-23/24-APC

Academic Policies Committee

POLICY: Priority and Scheduling of Registration

DEFINITIONS

Student populations:

Group 1: Graduate program and credential-program students

Group 2: Undergraduate students

The enrollment windows for students in this group are assigned by the number of units a student has completed. Enrollment windows are arranged in descending order, starting with students who have accumulated the highest number of earned, and progressing to those with fewer accrued units.

Group 3: All other unclassified graduate students and transitory students

Group 4: Students who are obligated to register after all regular students have registered based on participation in specific programs

Day one registration:

All students eligible for day one registration will be assigned an enrollment window date/time on the first day of registration regardless of the number of units earned. Students eligible for day one registration include:

Category A - Current foster youth and former foster youth and/or homeless youth and former homeless youth per Ed Code Article 3, Section 66025.9

Category B - Member or former member of the armed services per Ed Code Article 3, Section 66025.8

Category C - Students with disabilities registered with the Campus Disability Resource Center (CDRC) who would not otherwise achieve their academic goals within a reasonable period of time due to an ongoing disability

Category D - Students who participate in intercollegiate sports governed by the NCAA

Category E - Students who would not otherwise achieve their academic goals within a reasonable period of time because they participate in an ongoing, university-sanctioned activity that significantly benefits the university (See Procedures, Section B.3 for general eligibility criteria.)

Category F - Rare and extraordinary circumstance

The provost or vice president for enrollment management & student success may grant an individual student access to priority registration for a rare and extraordinary circumstance on a one-time basis.

Early registration:

Refers to registration occurring before others within their class. Class is defined as freshman, sophomore, junior, senior, credential, or graduate. Class is determined by the number of units earned. Students eligible for early registration include:

Category G - (*Undergraduate only*) Students currently approved into the California Promise program per Ed Code Title 3, Division 5, Part 40.2, Section 67434

Category H - Students with a dependent child or children younger than the age of 18 years of age who will receive more than half of their support from that student per AB 2881

Both definitions above fulfill the legislative requirements for priority registration under the California Education Code.

B. Eligibility Procedures for Day One Registration

- Category A Current foster youth and former foster youth and/or homeless youth and former homeless youth will be eligible in accordance with the CSU Priority Registration for Current or Former Foster Youth (https://calstate.policystat.com/policy/14569419/latest/).
- 2. Category B Member or former member of the armed services will be eligible in accordance with the CSU Priority Registration for Servicemembers and Veterans (https://calstate.policystat.com/policy/14094995/latest/).
- 3. Category C Students with documented disabilities registered with the Campus Disability Resource Center (CDRC) will be coded with the Office of the Registrar for day one registration. The CDRC shall submit a list of students in this group eligible for day one registration to the Office of the Registrar by the date set by the registrar.
- 4. Category D Students with documented eligibility and participation in intercollegiate athletics will be coded with the Office of the Registrar for day one registration. The Department of Intercollegiate Athletics shall submit a list of students in this group eligible for day one registration to the Office of the Registrar by the date set by the registrar.
- 5. Category E Coordinators student groups who wish to apply for day one registration on behalf of their students, including those who currently hold such status, shall apply to the Academic Policies Committee (APC) for continuation or granting of day one registration status. The APC, in consultation with the registrar and the vice president for enrollment management and student affairs, shall determine which student groups should receive day one registration. Any group that is not granted day one registration may re-apply the following year. The APC shall provide a written explanation to any student group that has been denied day one registration.

All three of the following criteria must be met in order to be granted day one registration under this category:

- The student must participate in a university-sanctioned activity that significantly benefits the university. This means that the benefits of the activity for the university as a whole are a consideration. However, participation in such an activity is a necessary but not sufficient condition for the privilege of day one registration.
- Day one registration must be necessary for the student to successfully participate in the activity. If the student can successfully participate in the program without day one registration, then day one registration will not be granted.
- Day one registration must be necessary to allow a sufficient number of students to participate in the activity to ensure its success.
- 6. Category F The provost or vice president for enrollment management and student success may grant day one registration to a student when the student and his/her academic advisor request and document a rare, extraordinary, and unforeseen hardship that would prevent such student from graduating or progressing towards graduation. The student-supplied documentation of the hardship, along with the written request from the academic advisor, must be forwarded to the Office of the Registrar in a timely fashion to allow day one registration for the following semester. Such exceptions would be made on rare occasions, case by case, and never more than once for any student.
